




#### Viral Videos

KEARNEY, Neb. — Social distancing doesn't always

mean stay at home, people have found creative ways to still be social while following CDC guidelines. One Kearney woman is trying to spread a little cheer to nursing home residents during this time. Staff at Mount Carmel Home said they're trying their best to keep their residents happy, especially that they are isolated now more than ever. They received a prehistoric surprise.

"Dinosaurs are welcomed here at Mount Carmel," Activities Director at Mount Carmel Home, Christina Hansen said. As the Activities Director, Christina Hansen said she always looks for ways to maintain the mental and emotional health for her residents, especially during this time of quarantine. She said she received an email from someone looking to entertain the residents. "The lady in the dinosaur!," said Hansen. The woman in the dinosaur chose to remain anonymous. "My grandmother went here, so I'm giving back to them and making people really happy," she said. The Kearney woman walked around the building, greeting people and showing off signs that she made for the residents.

"Getting out while we can, looking at our neighbours and seeing what we can do to put a smile on someone's face in this trying time. Even if we isolate ourselves, there's ways we can work around it and get to people," she said. Hansen said people can find beauty in this time. She said laughter is a way to push through it. "I think the more creative ways we can find to connect despite the fact that we can't physically connect, it's something silly and crazy but my residents are smiling and laughing, I'm smiling and laughing, my staff are smiling and laughing," said Hansen.

Hanses said staff help residents talk with family on Skype or other video calls to talk closely with families despite that there are no visits allowed at the moment

#### The Wisdom of Uncertainty

In this edition of Stay Calm During Covid we have an article by Andy Puddicombe, a meditation and mindfulness expert, writing for the meditation app Headspace.

Humans don't really know much at all.

This may not be something that we like to hear, but it's true. In uncertain times, it is only natural for us to search for certainty. It gives us a feeling of comfort, of safety, maybe even a sense of belonging. In a world where everything is constantly changing, the idea of certainty is both appealing and reassuring.

But in times of uncertainty, it is important to understand the difference between what we know and what we believe, what we know and what we suspect, and what we know and what we've been told.

What we *know* is only what we experience. If we let go of everything we've ever read, ever heard, or ever been told, then we are left with nothing but our experience. And even this is always changing as each moment and each experience moves into the next. So, when all is said and done, we are left with nothing but the experience of the present moment. The certainty of now.

For some, realising this brings a sense of calm and relief. We don't need to pretend to have all the answers. *Phew!* For others, the idea of having no certainty in life apart from the present moment can feel very stressful.

But there is no shame in not knowing, there is only freedom. An uncertain mind is an open mind. It is a curious, interested and reflective mind. When we meet life with a real sense of uncertainty, we stop seeing the world as we think we know it, and instead we see life for what it truly is. The same goes for the people around us. It is only in letting go of what we think is true about other people that we allow them to be who they truly are.

This is the wisdom of uncertainty.
